Danville Boulevard is a defining feature of the physical layout of our town. We all drive, ride, or walk it, perhaps quite often. This rustic, two-lane roadway is of scenic value not just in itself, but also because it sets a tone for the rest of Alamo. The Association for the Preservation of Danville Boulevard is a volunteer-based community organization established in 1970 with the express purpose of preserving and protecting the rustic, scenic character of the Danville Blvd. corridor in Alamo. We are committed to the principle that the Boulevard is worth preserving and protecting, for the benefit of the whole community. Our objectives are the following:

- ❖ Assist in the Boulevard of Trees campaign to restore the canopy of trees decimated by Dutch Elm disease in the 1970's
- ❖ Offer suggestions and comments to Contra Costa County on traffic issues
- ❖ Organize and coordinate clean-ups
- ❖ Protect the scenic qualities of the Boulevard through appropriate design and building codes
- ❖ Work toward keeping the Boulevard friendly for all, including pedestrians, bicyclists, equestrians (have you seen the crossing at Camille?), and preventing excess volume, noise, and speed of vehicular traffic
- ❖ Take part in county planning processes to ensure that the downtown area stays compact, pedestrian-friendly and accessible for all local residents

The ***Association for the Preservation of Danville Blvd*** accepts annual membership dues of \$15 per household. These make our programs and periodic newsletters possible. We also hold public meetings that you are welcome to attend.
